# 1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

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## 1.1 INTRODUCTION

Set against the majestic Dhauladhar Mountains, surrounded by dense pine trees and blessed with cool, quiet, pollution free, healthy environment, Govt PG College Dharamshala has the privilege to be one of the oldest institutions of the state affiliated to Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla. It takes pride in its glorious history of achievements. The college is housed in the building which has historical significance as it was earlier the residence of British officers. The building is a specimen of architectural brilliance that blends beautifully with its lush green scenic surroundings. The foundation stone of the college was laid by the then Lieutenant Governor of Punjab Sir Louis W. Dane on May 4, 1912. It became intermediate college in 1926 and started producing graduates in 1947. In 1977, it became the first college of the state to introduce post graduation in different streams. The journey of success still continues and the institution has widened its academic horizons by offering new courses like BBA, BCA, B.Tech, B.Voc, Bio-Tech, MBA, MCA, PGDCA, M.Com, M.Sc Chemistry, M.Sc Geography. Established to cater to the needs of the aspirants of higher education in the hilly areas of Himachal Pradesh, Govt PG College Dharamshala remains a popular destination for students from Kangra, Chamba, Kullu and Lahaul & Spiti districts. To facilitate quality education to students who come from far flung areas, a secure, homely and affordable hostel accommodation is provided to both girls and boys. The students not only from Himachal but also from other states join this institution for the benefit of higher education. The dedication of the college to achieve excellence is evident from the fact that it improved its NAAC grade from “Grade B” in 2003 to “Grade A” in 2015. It has IGNOU study centre. Its library has been N-Listed under INFLIBNET enabling the students an online access to books and journals. It is one of the largest libraries in the state with a rich treasure house of books. Even after the emergence of many more colleges in the surrounding areas, the college still continues its rich intellectual heritage and academic ethos.

Regular feedback and Action Taken Report system is maintained and documented by IQAC for improvement in various aspects of institutional operations and procedures. Regular meetings of IQAC are held and documented. Annual

action plan is prepared well in advance and Action Taken Report is generated at the end of the academic session. There is a well-developed, transparent and efficient Management Information System for admissions, examinations, and accounts. Optimal utilization of all resources is the key concern of the institution.

## **1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)**

### **Institutional Strength**

The institution takes pride in being one of the oldest institutions of the state with a splendid history and stays committed to the cause of quality education to all for more than a century. The college is situated in the idyllic setting of majestic Dhauladhar sharing its boundaries with the scenic international cricket stadium captivating the students across the state to enjoy their journey of education in the sylvan surroundings. The college is a powerful beacon of light as it is associated with a place which spreads the message of universal harmony and peace, being the abode of Holy Guru Dalai Lama .The College has convenient accessibility as it is ideally located with the excellent road, railway and air connectivity. To facilitate the students from the tribal/remote areas, the college runs three well equipped hostels. The strength of the college is evident from the fact that a minimum of 5000 students get enrolled in the college every year. The college offers a wide range of programmes and courses with 140 combinations of core and additional subjects with Innovative ICT enabled student centric teaching and a wide range of sports facilities with the collaboration of Sports Authority of India( SAI). To empower the students to meet the challenges of the corporate world and to provide them with better job opportunities, the college offers self-financed courses with good campus placements. Consistently excellent results with university top positions are to the credit of the college. The college facilitates distance learning with the privilege of an IGNOU centre in the campus. The college has academically brilliant,

experienced, diligent and dedicated faculty having strong professional ethics. The college has a shining galaxy of notable Alumni who have made their alma mater proud and their proclivity is evident from the valuable contributions towards the growth and development of the college. The spacious library with a large number of books, rare classics, journals and INFLIBNET facility serves as a rich treasure house of knowledge. Providing excellent opportunities and enabling the young girls with self defense techniques, by building up confidence and grit, the college is running an exclusive girls wing in NCC, which has recorded tremendous increase from 40 to 133 in the last five years.

### **Institutional Weakness**

Though the college has strong points to its credits yet there are certain areas in which the imperative attention is required. Since this college is not an autonomous College we are confined within the permissible domain of academic, sports and cultural activities. For enhancement of institutional growth and development, the number of permanent teaching staff in the College needs to be increased. The research is an area where some measures have to be initiated as the rules of affiliating university do not have the provision of granting permission to college teachers to work as research guide. No major grant for research has been sanctioned as there is no such institutional mechanism and it is basically dependent on the individual initiative of the teachers. There are comparatively less number of teachers with Ph.D. The college is an affiliated institution and is bound to follow the curriculum devised by the University and therefore not allowing much flexibility in curriculum design and delivery. This reduces the scope of changes in accordance with the requirements of students as well as teachers. The college lacks adequate infrastructure in SFC and still needs a proper campus for these courses. To empower the students with professional competence more vocational/add on courses are required.

### **Institutional Opportunity**

Entrepreneurship start up centre can be initiated for the benefit of consultancy and industrial interaction. With the association of Dalai Lama Trust college can establish Dalai Lama chair for research in Ancient Indian Wisdom and Buddhist Philosophy. Boosting up student exchange programmes at national and international level will provide an immense exposure to the raw youth. To establish Media Lab with proper infrastructure and Community Radio in JMC department for providing hands on training to students. Promotion of Research at UG and PG level through RUSA funding is to be encouraged. To set up SWAYAM/NPTEL centre in the college and the Inclusion of Faculty members as Experts in SWAYAM/NPTEL so that potential lying with the faculty can be utilized. House system to be introduced to make the students more responsible and devoted towards the alma mater and society. The services of a private practitioner can be engaged on contract basis to deal with medical emergencies in the campus. To upgrade technical and digital infrastructure is another milestone to be achieved. The rich experience and knowledge of the senior retired faculty members can be utilized to train and conduct FDPs that would induct the younger generation of students and faculty into the high quality of teaching and learning skills that stem from the timeless values and ethos of the college.

### **Institutional Challenge**

To instill the humanitarian values in the students in this age of commercialization of education is undoubtedly a serious challenge. Modern techno-savvy generation is quite ignorant about the thin line between knowledge

and easily available information which forbids them to furrow deep and eventually most of them are gullible and hence vulnerable to severe cyber crimes. Also, this easy accessibility has moved this generation from reading to surfing template. The swiftness of the response howsoever inexact has, made them impatient and restless. To keep intact the old glory of teacher hailed as Guru-the beacon of light and knowledge is a challenge. It is a challenge to obtain the Grants and Funding for pursuing research projects. The initiation of any new academic programme requires a long and complicated procedure for getting permissions from multiple authorities which often delays the process. The college caters to a large number of students who hail from the marginalized sections of society. The challenge of meeting their day-to-day educational and personal needs is an urgent and immediate need. Not being able to cope up with the stress created by the modern highly competitive educational world, students easily become the victim of psychological ailments like anxiety, frustration and depression. Sometimes to release the stress momentarily, they fall into the trap of narcotics and drug abuse. To counsel the youth to face such situations resiliently and boldly is yet another challenge.

### **1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY**

#### **Curricular Aspects**

The Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. In order to systemize everything at the beginning of the session, the academic processes are streamlined by taking all important components into consideration. Ensuring effective curriculum delivery has not been an easy task during this academic period as it witnessed varied changes of shifting from semester based, choice based credit system to annual system and later adapting to the mode of virtual education due to Covid pandemic situation. The academic design comes into action through lectures, seminars/webinars, presentations, assignments both in offline/online mode as per requirement. The institution keeps a track of the academic progress of the students through Continuous Comprehensive Assessment. The result of Mid Term examination is submitted to the examination committee for maintaining the records and to award the meritorious students for their achievements. Emotional health of the students is also taken care of by providing them counseling and guidance from time to time. The institution adheres to the academic calendar including for the conduct of CIE. Being affiliated to Himachal Pradesh University, the college follows the academic calendar notified by the University at the commencement of every academic year. This academic calendar defines landmark dates delineating schedule for teaching, examination and vacations. The calendar is customized by incorporating necessary changes required at college level, creating a special space for college events, which is communicated to students well advance in time. Thus the college aims to create a transformative educational experience focused on leadership, communication, and interpersonal skills, personal health and well-being. Students are also provided opportunities to interact with NGOs working with stray animals, specially abled children and slum inhabitants. NSS unit of the college makes special efforts for the conservation and re- functioning of dying water bodies. Vermicomposting is an initiative taken for environmental sustainability. The college provides ample equal opportunities and identical platforms to both boys and girl students in different student bodies and programmes organized in the college.

#### **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

The students of this institution have bagged many positions at university level in different arenas. In every Annual Function students are awarded for excelling in academics, sports and cultural activities at Intra College and Inter college level. Students participate in extension activities through various units/ clubs that help them to learn different professional and intellectual skills. Cleanliness drives, plantation drives, gender equity

awareness program, visits to villages and slum areas etc. are regular features of the college activities that help in engaging students intellectually, creatively, emotionally, socially and physically. Opportunities like “Swar Samvaad” and Tourizmo Trigarth Carnival etc. are provided to the students where they have been given free hand to organize the events. Different departments organize field works for the students so as to provide opportunities for the students to learn application of knowledge to the real world setting. The college has ICT enabled classrooms having Desktops, Laptops, and Projectors which help in the e-learning process. Students have an access to e-journals, INFLIBNET and library database. **Mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient.** In order to maintain transparency in the process, the answer sheets of the house tests are shown to the students. Final marks are sent to the university only after each student has been given ample opportunity and time to review and register her complaint, if any. Students are made aware of the course specific outcomes through orientation programme, classroom discussion and expert lectures. Programme specific outcomes of all the departments are shown through the career options available to students after completion of their degrees. The feedback system of different stakeholders helps to measure and reckon the attainment of the programme outcomes. Alumni of various departments are invited to the college to interact and guide students about potential careers. OSA also plays an active role in mentoring of students by not only providing financial assistance but also adequate guidance. IQAC plays a vital role in supervising over the functioning of all the components of the college and frame strategies for quality enhancement.

### **Research, Innovations and Extension**

A healthy environment is provided to the students so that they can come out with their innovative ideas and understand the practical exigencies of their respective academic domain. The institution organizes a range of research and extension activities for community welfare which also help multifaceted development of students. Some teachers have acted as Ph.D. supervisors. A research project was carried out in the institution with funding from ISRO. A number of publications by the faculty in various journals including Scopus, WoS and UGC-CARE, Springer etc gained an impetus with time. A good number of books and book chapters in edited books bearing ISBN and ISSN have also been published by the faculty. The College is in the forefront in hosting a number of conferences, workshops and seminars on entrepreneurship and other related fields. Students are encouraged to consult the books and e content other than their prescribed syllabus to refine their knowledge. In an effort to encourage more students in community welfare, various activities are carried out through organized platforms or departmental societies. These are:

National Service Scheme (NSS) aims to develop the personality of student volunteers through community services and to make them sensitive and responsible human beings who are aware of the socio-economic realities of India. One of NSS volunteers of the college has been awarded and honored by the Hon’ble President of India for best social service for the session 2020-21.

National Cadet Corps (NCC) The Youth wing of the Indian Armed Forces trains young students to live a life of discipline and service to society through various activities including residential training camps.

Red Ribbon Club: The Red Ribbon Club is a voluntary on-campus intervention program for students. They are engaged in various significant, constructive activities in the college throughout the session. Rovers & Rangers: The unit of Rovers and Rangers functions under the guidelines of Bharat & Scout Guide. The volunteers of this unit shoulder major responsibilities in various activities in the college. Departmental Societies: Various activities were undertaken by the Tagore Literary Society and Science Society and Geography society beneficial for the students in general.

### **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

The adequate infrastructural facilities and learning resources are necessary for providing qualitative academic environment to students. Government College Dharamshala is a premier higher education institution having a very large campus of about 12.25 acres with the covered area of 17023 sq. mts. 44 airy and spacious classrooms, and seminar halls, well equipped labs, 19 fully equipped class rooms with ICT facility, a rich infrastructure of computer labs with 244 computer systems having internet connection with band width of 200MBPS. The spacious library of the college is Wi-Fi enabled, having a total number of 21265 books of different subjects, 3563 reference books, 16 journals and all leading daily newspapers in Hindi and English. Under National Mission on Education Programme students can have online access to more than 90,000 e-books and 6150 e-journals on [http://nlist.inflibnet.ac.in /downloads.bhp](http://nlist.inflibnet.ac.in/downloads.bhp). A well-equipped, multipurpose auditorium with a seating capacity of 1026 people and enriched with excellent acoustics, a sound system with ten speakers, six amplifiers, a mixer, six wireless mikes and three other mikes. The auditorium is also equipped with a screen and a projector. There is a full stage system of 62 lights. A Seminar hall and a Multipurpose Prayas hall, Separate Music Room for vocal and instrumental events, Two Girls' Common Room, Two Girls' Hostels, One boys' Hostel, a large playground with provision for multiple games, such as, Athletics, Cricket, Football, Hockey, Volleyball, Basketball and even cricket. Badminton, basketball courts are also available. Indoor arrangements comprise of a badminton court, table tennis and gymnasium. Major infrastructural work and revamping was done in the college with the huge amount of Rs 143,248,282/- during last five years. The college has Rooftop Solar Power Plant with 55KVA Solar Grid Interactive Power Plant with a unit generation capacity of 57600 per year. The College has a power generator, serviced annually by the technicians. There is a well established system in the college for the optimum use of available infrastructure and its regular maintenance.

### **Student Support and Progression**

The college firmly believes in participative working and student partnership. It has a resourceful student support system. CSCA (College Students Central Association) is constituted annually as per the norms of the HP University. During the ceremony, officially recognized Student Council led by the President and the Vice-President of the council take an oath to serve in the interest of the institution and the society with integrity and devotion. These members in CSCA and Advisory committee act as a bridge between the administration and the students. Students also have representation in other administrative committees such as Grievance Redressal Cell and Anti-ragging Committee.

Students as editors and budding writers in college magazine "BHAGSU" contribute enthusiastically and learn the nuances of writing, editing and publication.

In hostels also, students perform important role in administration. The Hostel and Mess Committee (HMC) also comprises of students responsible for supervising the food and cleanliness.

Apart from this, GC Dharamshala also hosts events like "Swar Samvad", "TourizmoTrigarth Carnival" to provide platform to the students where events are planned, organized and managed by them. Having student progression as an important concern, the college also organizes counseling session, has a Yoga room and peace zone in the campus to reduce the stress related problems. Students have qualified many competitive exams like UGC, JRF, and IELTS etc. Besides offering all the scholarships under various government schemes, the college also offers scholarships and awards in various categories to support and encourage students. The OSA promotes a sustained sense of belongingness to the Alma Mater to form a vibrant, global network and forum of alumni, who will, in turn, help to raise the profile of the college. The rich library and Prayas Bhawan (housing IQAC Room, Seminar Hall, PGDCA Room etc.), well equipped and spacious Auditorium in the college are some of the initiatives taken by the OSA. To promote best practices in different areas of social life for the benefit of society, OSA envisions a transformative and empowering role for the students.

## **Governance, Leadership and Management**

The vision of the institution is to educate and train the students to be efficient and socially responsible individuals, empowering them to fulfill their academic and professional passions thus justifying the motto of the College **Asto ma sadgamaya**. IQAC, under the guidance of the Principal, devises the perspective plan in the beginning of every academic year towards achieving the goals of the institution. The administrative committees implement and execute the plan of the college. The College follows the practice of decentralization and participatory management in governance. The Principal conducts meetings with the Conveners of various committees/cells and decisions are taken with comprehensive consultations following the guidelines of Department of Higher Education. The members of different committees make sincere efforts to continuously improve the standard of all academic and co-curricular activities. The institution carries out all the welfare measures available for the government employees effectively. The College has a rich culture of institutional functioning through collaborative participation. Being the nodal agency for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies for the institution, the IQAC plays an important role in ensuring quality of the functioning of administrative and academic units of the college. The achievements of members of the staff are monitored through Performance Based Appraisal System (PBAS). The institution has an effective and transparent system to make the optimum use of the funds meticulously. The audit of the funds of the college is done by the government agencies. The parameters for academic audit are the annual results and placement record of the students. Feedback is collected from the students to improve upon the course content and its delivery mechanism. To ensure holistic development of students, academic curriculum is integrated with various extracurricular activities.

## **Institutional Values and Best Practices**

Shifting age-old misplaced notions of gender difference in educational goals, the college advocates education for both male and female students. Keeping this in mind, the college takes pride in providing hostel facility to the girl students belonging to the far-flung areas, where higher education is not easily accessible. The institution provides separate common rooms facility with vending machine to the girl students keeping in view the safety and security of the girl students. Providing excellent opportunities by channelizing the energy of young girls in constructive activities, enabling them with self defence techniques by inculcating the spirit of adventure and building up confidence and fortitude, the college is running an exclusive girls wing in NCC. It has opened new vistas for the girls to create a space in defence services. The institution is conscientiously managing the waste by segregating single use plastic, bio-medical waste and bio degradable waste and disposing them off in specific bins. The college campus is declared plastic free. Vermicomposting is adopted as a low-cost, environment friendly; alternative to expensive synthetic fertilizers. Proper drainage system is functional in the institution. The college is continuously making efforts to reduce the carbon footprints by switching over to alternative energy resources like solar power, LED lights for conservation of energy. The college promotes language and cultural diversity as many students belonging to Tibetan Buddhist community as well as far flung tribal communities study here. Awareness programmes like Ban on the use of plastic, Cleanliness, Health and Hygiene, Go Green etc. are organized to sensitize the students for burning issues. The institution sensitizes the students and the employees to the constitutional obligations by providing an effective, supportive, accessible and holistic learning environment and constantly makes serious endeavors to inculcate the values and consciousness of their rights and duties. . Keeping in mind the different facets of the personality of the individual, the students are provided a chance to participate in miscellaneous activities catering to their taste and talent. The youth is motivated for selfless social service through the practices like ‘Cultivating a Compassionate Heart’.

#### 1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

##### 1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

###### Response:

- The College is affiliated to Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla and as such follows the curriculum prescribed by it. Apart from the regular B.A/B.Sc./B.Com and PG Courses, the college also offers self-financed courses like BCA, MCA, MBA, Biotechnology and Certificate Courses. Hence, a myriad number of courses are offered by the institute to meet diverse academic needs of the students and to improve their employability skills.
- Within the established academic structure things are planned meticulously to bring out the best results. In order to systemize everything at the beginning of the session, the academic processes are streamlined by taking all important components into consideration like academic calendar, availability of teachers/students, workloads, timetable and infrastructure.
- Ensuring effective curriculum delivery has not been an easy task during this academic period as it witnessed varied changes of shifting from semester based, choice based credit system to annual system and later adapting to the mode of virtual education due to covid pandemic situation.
- The academic design comes into action through lectures, seminars/webinars, presentations, tutorials, assignments and academic discussions both in offline/online mode as per requirement.
- To keep abreast of recent times teachers are encouraged to use ICT enabled lecture delivery, audio visual aids, smart boards and LCD projectors. Educational tours and field visits are organised periodically to take students beyond the curriculum. Teachers also enhance their knowledge through active involvement in Research and Faculty Development Programmes.
- The college has a rich library which provides access to a vast repertoire of journals, reports, books etc as well as e-resources to strengthen the teaching- learning processes.
- The institution keeps a track of the academic progress of the students through Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA). CCA accounts for 30% of the final grade. It is determined on

the basis of class room attendance (5 marks), Mid Term Test (15 Marks), Assignments/Seminars (10marks). Student has to attend at least 75% of lectures/tutorials/practical. Student having less than 75% attendance is not allowed to appear in the end semester examination. For this purpose the proper record of the attendance is maintained by the respective teachers in the attendance register.

- The result of Mid Term examination is submitted to the examination committee for maintaining the records and to award the meritorious students for their achievements.

- To strengthen the pursuit of effective curriculum transaction, tutorial groups are formed and mentors are provided to the students as per their needs. The college also believes in promoting overall well being of the students, so emotional needs are also taken care of by providing them counselling and guidance from time to time. Students are engaged actively in different units/clubs and societies to develop a compassionate attitude towards others.

- The College calendar serves not only as productivity booster for the institution but also reflects commitment to advancing in intellect and growing in spirit. It creates a special space for college events like the ‘Annual Athletic Meet’, Youth Festival(Inter college cultural competition) and “SwarSamvaad”(Cultural Programme)which is organized by CSCA (College Students’ Central Association). - The College dedicates itself to human values and ethics for creating a sustainable and egalitarian society. Consistent efforts are put in through academic and co-curricular programs. Societies, clubs and units work in tandem to execute this vision of the college.
- In the special lecture series based on “Cultivating a Compassionate Heart” students are given an opportunity to interact with NGOs working with stray animals, specially abled children and slum inhabitants.
- To instill patriotic fervor, cultural and spiritual values among students , various days related to the occasion are celebrated with enthusiasm by different departments
- Department of Psychology conducts frequent counseling sessions for students facing stress related issues or other issues pertaining to adolescence. The department also involves students in extension services and takes them on visits to slum areas so as to sensitize them towards vulnerable and deprived section of the society.
- Department of Physics organised a symposium on Human Values in Education in collaboration with SAI Educare Vidya Pratishthan to inculcate value oriented education in the youth.

### **GenderEquity:**

- The college provides ample equal opportunities and identical platforms to both boys and girl students in different student bodies and programs organized in the college.
- Awareness programs and guest lectures on gender equity are organized.
- Exemption in tuition fee is given to all the girl students enrolled in various courses in accordance with H.P Govt norms.
- One seat is reserved for single girl child in PG courses.
- Girls are provided a separate common room with a vending machine in toilets in order to improve menstrual hygiene.
- Women Grievance and Redressal Cell works effectively in the college to take up issues of any kind of harassment against girl students or women employees.

## 2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

### 2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

#### Response:

- The institution aims at establishing a supportive learning culture for all kinds of learners and clearly understands that the conventional one-size-fits-all approach in teaching doesn't benefit much. So, immediately after students get admitted to the college, teachers start assessing their learning levels.
- To identify the level of learners, different mechanisms are used such as observation method, oral and written class tests, group discussions and internal examination etc.
- Once the level is identified the fast, moderate and slow learners are approached in different ways. Since most of our students hail from rural background it is observed that they find it difficult to communicate in English. Keeping this in mind, bilingual method is used for teaching and they are encouraged to explore and learn at their own pace until they overcome their hesitation and get adapted.
- Slow learners do not have intellectual disability, but it takes them longer to understand and grasp concepts. So, Remedial Classes are organized to bring the learners at par.
- While generally, the teaching methods are aimed at the moderate learners, it is fully understood that the gifted learners may not remain unattended. So the advance learners are stimulated and encouraged to read extra books and given extra assignments.
- For holistic development of the students, the college organizes numerous academic, sports and cultural events through NSS, NCC, Rovers and Rangers and Sports.

Students are awarded for their achievements at various forums in terms of cash awards, medals, appreciation certificates and scholarships. In every Annual Function students are awarded for excelling in academics, sports and cultural activities at Intra College and Inter college level. They are also motivated to secure rank and distinction in university examination. The students of this institution have bagged many positions at university level in different arenas.

## 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

### 2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

#### Response:

- Structure of Internal Assessment is followed as per the norms of HPU, Shimla. It acquires 30% weightage in overall assessment of the students. The breakup of Internal Assessment as follows: 15 % through House Examination; 10% through Assignments, Projects and Presentations; 5% through Attendance.
- In order to maintain punctuality, a minimum of 75 % attendance is mandatory eligibility criteria for the students.
- To ensure transparency, the students are informed about the basic eligibility of the Internal Assessment Evaluation Criteria through college website, notice boards and class counselling. Teachers ensure that the students are aware of it and discuss it in detail to enhance transparency and involvement.
- Assignments, class tests, seminars, paper presentations and mini-projects are a regular feature of the curriculum. Through these students are provided multiple opportunities to improve their performance and make the teaching learning environment more interesting and effective.
- Some disciplines such as Commerce, Life Sciences, Physical Sciences, Computer Applications and Mathematics have Practical Components as part of their Curriculum which focus on problem solving skills using ICT techniques and Software. They are assessed through practical exams.
- Students who are unable to take midterm exams or submit assignments due to some unavoidable reasons are provided another chance to be assessed.
- To encourage students, toppers of the mid term exams are awarded in the Annual Function and Remedial classes are taken for the weaker students.
- Teachers are given free hand to choose their own evaluation method for 10% of marks carried by presentations, submission of assignments or even viva voce whereby students are encouraged to participate in interactive sessions, powerpoint presentations, projects and assignments.

### 2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal/external examination related grievances is transparent, time-

**bound and efficient****Response:**

- Being a constituent college of HPU Shimla, it follows the guidelines set by the University for the conduct of examinations. Final exams are uniformly conducted for students across all the constituent colleges of the University. The final exam for each paper has 70% weightage of overall assessment and the remaining 30% constitute internal assessment marks.
- In the beginning of the session, students are informed about the criteria of Internal Assessment which is a part of a continuous evaluation system conducted through Class Tests, Tutorials, Assignments, Projects and Presentations. All of these are carried out in a well-planned, transparent and systematic manner.
- Once the assessment is prepared, it is conveyed to the students by the concerned teacher. The rightful grievances of the students pertaining to the marks obtained in the internal assessment are taken up by the faculty. In order to maintain transparency in the process, the answer sheets of the house tests are shown to the students. Final marks are sent to the university only after each student has been given ample opportunity and time to review and register her complaint, if any.
- In case of grievances regarding the evaluation of university answer scripts, the students are guided to opt for re-evaluation of university answer scripts.

### 3.4 Extension Activities

#### 3.4.1 Extension activities are carried out in the neighborhood community, sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development, and impact thereof during the last five years.

##### Response:

**Response:** The institution organizes a range of extension activities for community welfare which also help multifaceted development of students. In an effort to encourage more students, various activities are carried out through organized platforms or departmental societies. Teachers and students take active part in these activities. These activities not only inculcate responsibility but also promote social sense among the students and prepare them for upcoming challenges. These activities are performed through various platforms provided by the institution. These are:-

**National Service Scheme (NSS)** is a Central Sector Scheme of Government of India, Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports that aims to develop the personality of student volunteers through community services and to make them sensitive and responsible human beings who are aware of the socio-economic realities of India. The college has two NSS (both girls and boys) Units. It organizes camps for students within and outside the college campus. Adult literacy drives, cleanliness and the plantation drives are carried out by NSS volunteers in the nearby villages. Health related programmes are also conducted in these villages. Blood donation camps are frequently organized with the collaboration of Government and Non-Government organizations. Days and weeks are also celebrated to sensitize students towards the social and national issues. One of our NSS volunteers has been awarded and honored by the Hon'ble President of India for best social services for the session 2020-21.

**National Cadet Corps (NCC)** The Youth wing of the Indian Armed Forces trains young students to live a life of discipline and service to society through various activities including residential training camps. NCC has been actively participating in various camps/activities and has won many awards. The institution has two NCC units, both boys (5 HP COY) and girls (1HPGIRLS BN). Extension activities like Road Safety Campaigns, Street Plays related to serious issues in the society, Awareness Programmes and Celebration of the important days instilling patriotic fervor, Cleanliness drives are also carried out by NCC cadets. Rallies are frequently organized to spread mass awareness by the cadets. Blood donation camps are also organized by NCC units in which cadets do take active part.

**Red Ribbon Club:** The Red Ribbon Club is a voluntary on-campus intervention program for students. The programme organized by RRC addresses the knowledge, attitude and behavior of the youth in the interrelated areas of Voluntary Blood Donation, HIV & AIDS. Awareness camps are organized in the college by the RRC to inculcate their sense of responsibility towards society. It also engaged the students in multifarious activities.

**Rovers & Rangers:** The unit of Rovers and Rangers functions under the guidelines of Bharat & Scout

Guide. The volunteers of this unit shoulder major responsibilities in various activities in the college. They are engaged in various significant, constructive activities in the college throughout the session.

- The institution is easily accessible and has a campus area of 12.25 acres which is well-equipped with *good* quality *infrastructure* for academics as *well* as extra-curricular and co-curricular activities.
- Built to cater to the educational needs of the hilly area, the institute remains a popular destination for students especially girls from regions like Kullu, Chamba and Lahul & Spiti as it also provides affordable hostel facility. At present, it has two girls' hostels and one boys' hostel to accommodate students who come from the different parts of the state.
- The whole campus is Wi-Fi enabled for the benefit of students and faculty.
- The College has different academic blocks which house both faculty rooms as well as classrooms. The college facilitates a blend of traditional and modern modes of teaching by providing podiums, green boards, LCD screens, Wi-Fi/ LAN, LMS and ICT facility.
- The College has taken measures to address the need for vigilance and security. The campus is CCTV-enabled to cater to the safety requirements.
- The well-stocked College Library is spread over two floors of an imposing building, with a total area of 3250 sq meters. It is Wi-Fi enabled and has a seating capacity of 240.
- The college owns a magnificent auditorium with a seating capacity of about. Extensively used for extra-curricular events and for hosting functions of the college, it has an advanced light and sound system. It is equipped with a large stage, green rooms, comfortable seating, carpeting, wall paneling for acoustic effects, air-conditioners, washrooms and a smart control room.
- The college provides an eco-friendly environment to its students with the latest initiatives of **solar heating, rainwater harvesting, vermicomposting and other green initiatives.**
- The college campus has been made specially-abled **friendly** by constructing special ramps and washrooms.
- For students' recreation there is a canteen facility.
- The College has a basic health care unit to provide medical support in its campus to provide immediate medical assistance to needy students and staff members.

**4.1.2 The Institution has adequate facilities for cultural activities, sports, games (indoor, outdoor), gymnasium, yoga centre etc.**

**Response:**

The college is committed to offer resourceful infrastructure for holistic growth of students. It provides adequate facilities for cultural activities, indoor and outdoor sports as well as other student and faculty support amenities.

- A well-equipped, multipurpose auditorium with a seating capacity of 1026 people and enriched with excellent acoustics, a sound system with ten speakers, six amplifiers, a mixer, six wireless mikes and three other mikes. The auditorium is also equipped with a screen and a projector. There is a full stage system of 62 lights. The auditorium facilitates organising seminars, workshops and cultural functions.
- A seminar hall and a multipurpose Prayas hall also provide convenient space for organizing cultural events.
- The college takes part actively in Inter college competitions like Youth Festival, wherein multiple cultural events are organized. Due to its well-equipped infrastructure the college also gets an opportunity to host such big events.
- Various clubs/units and societies that are being run in the college provide ample opportunities to inculcate leadership and managerial qualities by organizing, regulating, and scheduling activities for these clubs under the direction of the faculty coordinators.
- The college has a large playground with provision for multiple games, such as, Athletics, Cricket, Football, Hockey, Volleyball, Basketball and even cricket. Badminton, basketball courts are also available. Indoor arrangements comprise of a badminton court, table tennis and gymnasium.
- Besides there is a provision of availing indoor and outdoor sports facility from DYSA (District Sports and Youth Affair) which lies in close proximity to the college. It provides indoor sports facilities like badminton, table tennis, kabaddi and gymnasium. It also has an excellent synthetic track for athletics
- Students of the college can also avail cricket facility on membership basis from HPCA (Himachal Pradesh Cricket Association) that lies adjacent to the college campus.
- Yoga and self defense classes are organized from time to time in the college. A Martial Arts Club is being run by NSS to teach such techniques to the students.

### 4.3 IT Infrastructure

#### 4.3.1 Institution frequently updates its IT facilities including Wi-Fi

**Response:**

These IT facilities are provided to the students as well to the faculty members through various computer labs and e-resource centre.

The IT infrastructure of the college is regularly updated in accordance with the emerging needs. There are above 244 working computers for students, teaching and official purposes.

Purchasing of hardware components and software are done through GEM Portal and by inviting quotations through various vendors. There is a constant attempt to add on more computers and other IT gadgets to the present infrastructure. The college has internet facility having speed of 200mbps through leased line.

The college campus is having a Wi-Fi facility. ICT Data Base Committee keeps record of IT facility and assesses its adequacy and informs accordingly to the concerned departments and the Principal.

The College Website, <https://www.gcdharamshala.in> is another important IT based interface to provide all key information about the teaching departments, their faculty and learning outcomes, the important college branches, the feedback mechanism, the grievance redressal structure, the admission rules and regulation, the code of conduct and other vital activities. The existing college website is upgraded to include databases and many additional modules.

During recent COVID 19 lockdown, the teachers adapted to virtual teaching and remained connected with their students through different digital mediums to teach them, to solve their queries, to counsel them and to fulfil their learning needs.

#### **Detail of the IT facilities added and nature of updation**

Session 2016-17: The College introduced many new editions to its repository of licensed software. Visual Studio Software was purchased for Rs. 2,30,100/- for the Department of MCA and BCA. HP400IPC Desktop was purchased for Rs. 38,850/- for the Department of BBA. Renovation of smart class room in the Department of Commerce was done for Rs. 91,000/-

Session 2017-18: CCTV cameras were installed in the Departments of MBA, MCA, BCA, PGDCA and Chemistry costing Rs. 4,02,658/-. Projector Screen and Printers worth Rs. 1,05,839/- were added at different departments in the college campus. Dell computers worth Rs. 16,19,908 /- were purchased for different labs. Networking of MCA Lab was done for Rs. 39,225/-. Repair work worth Rs. 84,925/- was carried out during the session.

Session 2019-20: More computers, projectors were purchased for the computer labs in the campus worth Rs. 13,83,490/-. More CCTV were added in the college campus worth Rs. 1,07,543. A UPS installation, Keyboard, Mouse & Repair works were carried out in the labs worth Rs. 79,832/-.

Session 2020-21: To keep a check over any untoward occurrence, more CCTV cameras worth Rs. 59,012 were installed in the college campus. More computers were added during the session worth Rs. 2,51,837/- to meet the requirement. Podium worth Rs. 78,392/-, Projector worth Rs. 13,320/- and an UPS worth Rs. 29,939/- were also added during the session.

#### 4.4.2 There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc.

##### **Response:**

Proper care is given to the maintenance and utilization of infrastructure and equipment so that optimal utilization can be ensured

- **Laboratories:**

The maintenance of all the laboratories of various departments falls under the supervision of lab attendants supervised by a senior lecturer assistant (SLA). The outdated equipment and chemicals are disposed off as per the rules of the District Administration or of Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla. Stock registers are



methodically maintained and checked by the stock verification committee at the end of every financial year. The stock verification committee is constituted by the Principal having members from other departments as well as the laboratory staff of the concerned department. The report is finally verified by the Principal of the College.

- **Library:**

Library committee is constituted by the Principal to discuss various issues concerning library. All new purchased books and journals are entered into library accession registers. Damaged / lost books are written off by following all codal formalities and procedures as per govt. of HP regulations. Annual stock verification of the library resources is duly carried out by the library committee and the report is submitted to the Principal. The librarian is assisted by the supporting staff comprising of an assistant librarian, restorer, a library clerk and cleaner for effective and smooth functioning of the library.

- **Sports:**

A Sports Committee comprising of one faculty member from the department of physical education and three faculty members from other departments holds monthly meetings for maintenance of sports infrastructure. Ground staff is attached with the department of physical education for the proper maintenance and working of tracks and grounds. Latest equipment required for different sports activities is purchased at the beginning of the new session and as and when required. This is done by the purchase committee comprising of senior faculty members of the college. Proper stock register of sports equipment purchased and in use is maintained. Every year facilities are upgraded by adding new equipments. Damaged sports material is auctioned by a properly constituted committee by the principal.

- **Computer Laboratories:**

The college has six computer labs and smart class rooms with Wi-Fi facilities. The teacher in charges of each department takes care of the maintenance and up keep of its infrastructure. A strong firewall has been installed to protect the computer systems from data theft.

- **Class rooms:**

The College has different teaching blocks with well-ventilated and well- maintained classrooms, some of which are ICT enabled. Full time care takers have been appointed to take care of the maintenance of the blocks. In every block at least three to four persons have been deployed for the proper cleanliness and maintenance of the class rooms. A team of efficient workers is responsible for keeping the college premises clean. Besides, different committees and clubs have been constituted for the upkeep and maintenance of

various physical academic facilities. College Advisory Committee, Infrastructure Development and Maintenance Committee and Purchase committee ensure transparency, accountability and fairness in procurement of necessary articles required in the college. Govt. of H.P has also introduced GEM online portal for the purchase of different articles required in the college. Electricity and Water related committees are constituted for the maintenance of electrical and water supply in all the blocks of the college. The college also has a generator for use in emergency situations of electricity failure. Campus Beautification Committee and Eco Club find creative ways to spruce up the campus area.

- These members in CSCA and Advisory committee act as a bridge between the administration and the students. Such platforms bring a positive transformation in their personality and provide an opportunity to the students to share their thoughts and vision in the interest of the institution. They also promote leadership abilities in the youth.
- Regular meetings of CSCA and Advisory Committee are organized for the redressal of grievances of the students.

- Students are given due representations in academic associations of the college. Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) committee also has one or two student members in its constitution. They participate in decision making and policy formation activities of the IQAC.
- Students also have representation in other administrative committees such as Grievance Redressal Cell and Anti-ragging Committee.

### 6.1.2 The effective leadership is visible in various institutional practices such as decentralization and participative management

#### Response:

Response:

The college follows the practice of decentralization and participative management in its true sense. The administration is decentralized to ensure the quality of educational provisions. The administrative functions of the institution are mostly carried out in a participatory manner through various committees. The Principal conducts meetings with the Conveners of various committees, College Advisory, IQAC, RUSA Coordinator, CSCA, PTA, and OSA in which discussions are held and decisions are taken with comprehensive consultations. The advisory committee consisting of the seniors and experienced faculty members advises the principal on various important issues from time to time. In addition to the committees that are notified in the prospectus, new committees are formed and notified through office order as and when required. The administrative staff is also entrusted with varied responsibilities. Proposals are also invited from the departments for the necessary development of infrastructure etc. and steps are taken keeping in view the availability of the finances.

Case Study

The practice of decentralization and participatory management is reflected in the effective conduction of exams by the college which has the strength of more than six thousand students. The mid-term exams/house exams are conducted in the College every year by the examination committee of the College. The convener/in-charge of the examination committee calls a meeting of all the faculty members chaired by the Principal of the College. The convenient dates for the exams, completion of syllabus, and the schedule of other activities of the College are taken into account while deciding the schedule of examinations. The members of the faculty inform the examination committee about the percentage of the syllabus completed and the time needed to complete the remaining syllabus before midterm as per HP University guidelines. Thus keeping in view these matters, the tentative exam dates are fixed. It is also ensured that the students get sufficient time for preparation. For the smooth conduction of exams, the teaching and non teaching staff of the college is duly assigned the duties. The answer scripts are then collected

from the examination committee by the respective teachers. After evaluation, the answer scripts are shown to the students to ensure the transparency and satisfaction of the students. After which the award lists are made and submitted to the examination branch. The record of the house exams is kept by the examination committee and the concerned teacher.

## 6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

### 6.2.1 The institutional Strategic / Perspective plan is effectively deployed

#### Response:

Response: The College has a perspective plan of development which has been prepared by IQAC after consultation with all the stakeholders. It also includes various components like introduction of new courses and filling up vacant teaching posts on priority basis. As

the old science block was lacking in certain basic amenities, a new Science Block equipped with modern facilities is under construction at the cost of about Rs. 9 Crores. To provide better academic environment to the students, modernization and strengthening of classrooms and laboratories with furniture and latest equipments is carried out. To provide potential career opportunities to the students in the global corporate world, self financing courses had been introduced in the college. Taking a step to fulfill the urgent requirement in terms of infrastructure (e.g. smart class rooms, conference halls, computer labs) new MBA Block and B. Tech Block are to be constructed. A multipurpose hall for MCA department is also under construction. To protect and preserve the historical building of the College, repairs are done from time to time. . The college is situated in the region endowed with sufficient solar radiation. In order to provide a greener environment to the future generations, a step towards environment protection is the installation of the solar panel. An internal committee was constituted in college for assessing the viability of the project. The committee submitted a positive report and the matter was discussed with IQAC. A site survey was conducted and three Solar panels of 25 KVA,15KVA and 15 KVA were proposed and installed on the roof tops of Prayas Bhawan, Library and Arts Block. To provide easy access to the library resources and the library facilities, automation of the library and learning resources is under process. The college campus is also to be fully computerized with Wi-Fi/Internet facility. In order to provide free wi- fi facility to the students, Free Wi-Fi Access Zones, are marked in the campus.

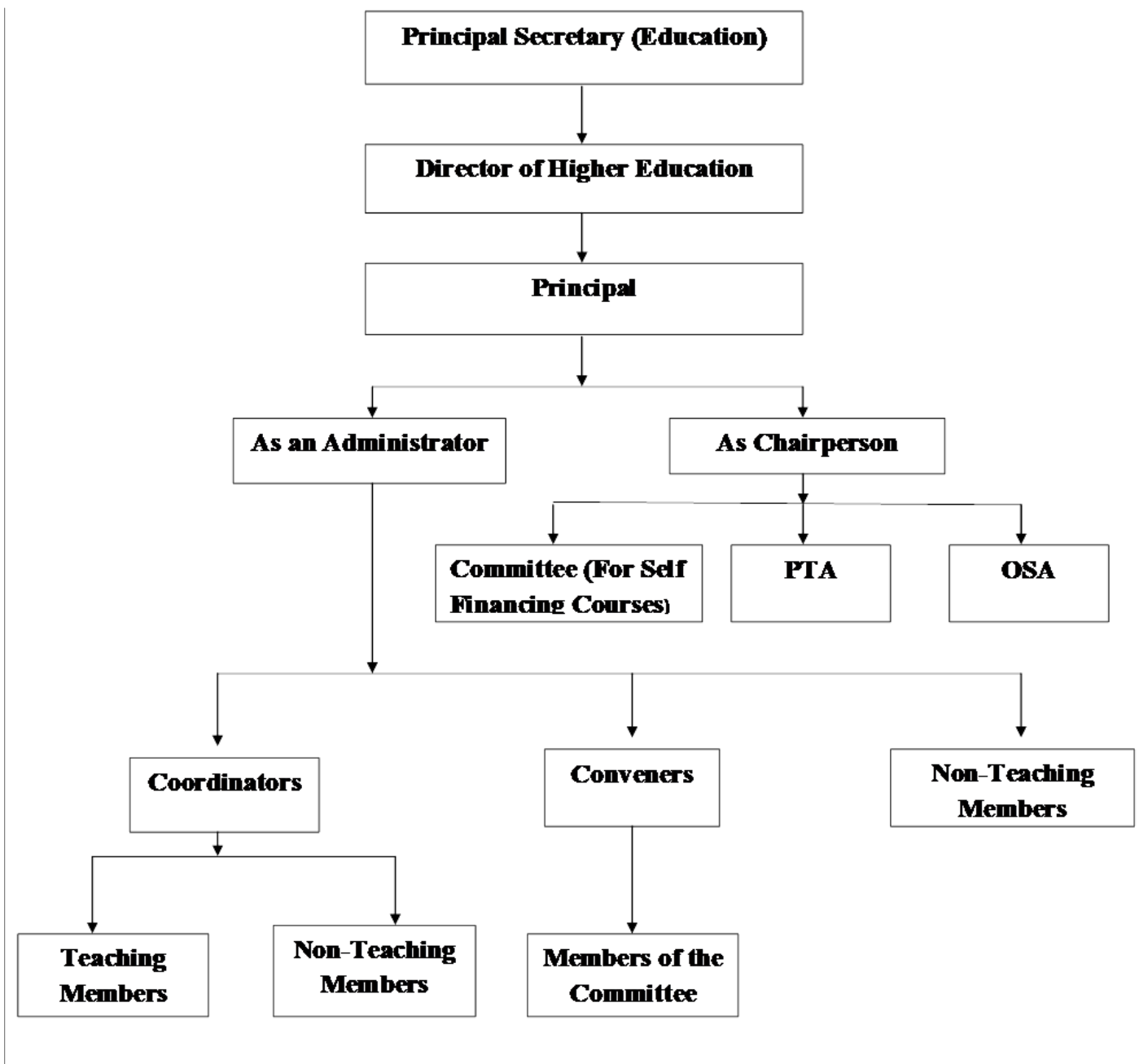
**6.2.2 The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment, service rules and procedures, etc.**

As the College is governed by HP Govt., the recruitment, promotion and service rules are decided by the Govt. / HPPSC /SSB. The appointment of teachers is done by HP Govt. through H.P.P.S.C. The college is not authorized to recruit teachers on regular basis but some stop gap arrangement is made at institutional level through local PTA and self financing scheme.

The Principal with his remarks forwards the PBAS Performa to the higher authorities. Performance appraisal of non-teaching staff is based upon Annual Confidential Report (ACR). Performance assessment of the non-teaching staff member is based upon evaluation by Office Superintendent and then the Principal evaluates the ACR and forwarded to the higher authorities for further evaluation.

PBAS of the Individual concerned is considered for the career advancement and promotion of the faculty member by the Director of Higher Education and ultimately by the State Govt. On the basis of performance appraisal, incentives are continued and if the same is not satisfactory then the incentives like promotion, award of scales etc. are withheld.

#### 6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

Response: The efficacy of the governance can be assessed easily by the proper mobilization of the funds and the optimum use of them. The institution has an effective and transparent system to make the optimum use of the funds meticulously.

Resource mobilization policy and procedures of the institution The College Auditorium was constructed by OSA (Old Students Association) under government plan in the ratio of 20:80 with a seating capacity of around one thousand. This auditorium also earns revenue for the institution

as it is being rented out to different agencies for organizing academic and cultural functions as per college bye-laws. In addition to that various government functions are also organised in the auditorium as and when required.

Under the Self Financing Schemes, the institution runs various courses like MCA, MBA, PGDCA, B.Tech. , Bio-Tech., BBA, BCA that generate funds for the college. Funds received from the Government like RUSA fund is utilized for construction, up gradation and purchase of equipments. For utilization of funds following are procedural formalities:

#### Response:

The Utilization of funds is done in a transparent manner. Various committees ensure that the work is done in a systematic way for the smooth functioning of the college. The college receives funds through fees of the students and PTA (Parents Teachers Association). The funds generated are utilized for the college welfare.

IQAC made significant contribution for institutionalizing quality assurance strategies and processes. All quality assurance strategies were framed and subsequently reviewed by IQAC in its regular meetings. IQAC adopts practices that help in providing quality education to students

through an effective and meaningful teaching learning environment.   - ? CCTV cameras, digital podiums were installed and full internet connectivity is provided for the whole campus.
  - ? High power generator with 65KV has been installed to have the uninterrupted power supply in the campus.

The College has a rich culture of institutional functioning through collaborative participation. The IQAC plays an important role in ensuring quality of the functioning of administrative and academic units of the college.

### **Integrated and Well Knit Framework**

1. A well established and integrated framework for regularly reviewing its teaching learning process, structures and methodologies of operation and learning outcomes at periodic intervals.
2. All the academic activities are planned and managed in the institution with the help of various administrative committees. These committees are constituted for every academic session.
3. The help of PTA and OSA is taken for the welfare of the institution.
4. IQAC regularly encourages supporting staff to participate in the training programs for the upgradation of their skills regarding IT or special training on computer tools.
5. IQAC holds meeting periodically with the members of teaching and non-teaching staff of the college and their valuable suggestions are also considered while taking any decision for further improvements.

### **Academic Audit**

1. The institution undertakes academic audit. The parameters to measure the performance of the faculty in academic activities are annual results and placement record of the students.
2. Students and teachers feedback was taken periodically to evaluate teaching-learning process and methodologies.
3. To ensure holistic development of students, academic curriculum was integrated with various extracurricular activities. The achievements of the students in various academic, cultural and sports activities are recorded officially.

### **Structures and Methodologies of Operations**

1. The syllabus is downloaded from the website at the beginning of every session.
2. Time table is made well in advance before the commencement of class work
3. Necessary measures are taken to implement the timetable to cover the syllabus in the stipulated period.
4. Students are informed about the syllabus, books and the assignments that they have to submit during the accomplishment of their course.
5. Meetings are held with the students by their respective teachers to know the progress of course coverage and the efficacy of teaching learning process.
6. The students who face difficulty in their academics are guided to consult their respective teachers to clear their doubts.
7. The students are motivated to visit the library daily to read other reference books and enhance their knowledge.
8. The syllabus of all the faculty members is reviewed to ensure the uniform coverage of syllabus before the midterm exams as per HP University guidelines.
9. Feedback is collected from the students to improve upon the course content and its delivery mechanism.

### **Attainment of Programme Outcomes, Programme Specific Outcomes and Course Outcomes**

- IQAC encourages innovative pedagogical methodologies like Power Point Presentations, Projects, Field Trips, educational tours, Workshops, videos etc. in addition to the completion of curriculum

through Assignments, Class Tests, presentations etc.

- Departments are encouraged to organize Conferences and Seminars on themes relevant to the educational needs and futuristic growth of the students.
- Internship and employment opportunities are made available to the students by inviting reputed companies to the College through the Placement Cell or the Departments. These add to the learning outcomes of the undergraduate programmes and courses being taught to the students.
- IQAC has ensured that all labs are fully equipped with ICT facilities. In the past five years, after accreditation, there has been infrastructure augmentation with the construction of an auditorium, ongoing construction of a new science block, smart classrooms which are multimedia equipped with projectors and whiteboards as screens.
- Audio-Visual Rooms have been set up to facilitate teachers to record their lectures. Teachers are encouraged to use ICT tools to prepare and deliver their lectures through audios, videos and PPTs.
- A new MCA computer lab with the facility of 26 PC's has been established to keep the students abreast with modern techniques.
- The college offers certificate add-on course on Ancient Wisdom and Learning to acquaint the students with the treasure of Vedic wisdom.

## Criterion 7 - Institutional Values and Best Practices

### 7.1 Institutional Values and Social Responsibilities

#### 7.1.1 Measures initiated by the Institution for the promotion of gender equity during the last five years.

##### Response:

Response: Achieving long-term and sustainable social change by creating and promoting a safe, holistic academic environment for all the learners, is the prime concern of the institute. For shifting age-old misplaced notions of gender difference in educational goals, the college advocates education for both male and female students. Keeping this in mind, the college takes pride in providing hostel facility to the girl students belonging to the far flung areas, where higher education is not easily accessible. At present ,two girls' hostels:Tribal and General with a capacity of 118 boarders are functioning effectively in the institute. The institution is quite sensitive to the safety and security of the students. Committees such as Discipline and Anti-Ragging committees have been formed to take up complaints against any kind of discrimination. CCTV cameras have also been installed in and around the college campus to monitor the activities of the students. In order to nurture and promote gender sensitivity and career consciousness among students, a special Counseling Cell for girls has also been formed in the college.The Cell regularly counsels students through interaction. The college also has Equal Opportunity Cell which organizes extension lectures, seminars, visits on the related themes. A Gender Champion is also selected among the girl students to coordinate such programmes. Grievances Redressal Cell has also been formed to register complaints ofharassment and to undertake formal proceedings to resolve them. Display of helpline numbers of various services such as Police Helpline, Women Helpline and Medical Helpline etc. are prominently displayed in various zones of the college for the benefit of the students. Information of important government schemes, events, legislation, and court rulings are disseminated through display boards and college website. The institution provides separate common rooms facility to the girl students keeping in view the safety and security of the girl students. Along with this, girls have also been provided the facility of vending machines and a special committee has been formed to inspect the proper functioning and maintenance of this. A sick room is also established in the college campus for the students. Providing excellent opportunities by channelizing the energy of young girls in constructive activities, enabling them with self defence techniques by inculcating the spirit of adventure and to build up confidence and fortitude, the college is running an exclusive girls wing in NCC. It has opened new vistas for the girls to create a space in defence services also. Special scholarships sponsored not only by the Govt. but also by the OSA of the college are offered to girl students. Different Units /Clubs /Societies organize events like slogan writing, poster making, debates and declamations etc. that reinforce the institution's larger vision and mission to provide empowering education to young women. Girl students are given age relaxation for admission at UG and PG level as per the government guidelines. They are given due representation in CSCA (College Student Central Association), a student body that plays a significant role in assisting the college administration.

Solid Waste Management:

Following the Government of India's resolution to ban all single-use plastics, the college administration declared the college campus plastic free. The ban is applicable to all entities. Specified dustbins have been placed in the college campus at different points where solid waste is collected to be properly disposed off later. Department of Botany vermicomposts organic waste to produce a low-cost, environment friendly, alternative to

expensive synthetic fertilizers like NPK. This initiative helps in maintaining the polyhouse plants as well. We have two pits near the polyhouse itself. Collection drives for newspapers and posters have been organized by NSS and Eco Club on regular basis which are auctioned further. Awareness programmes are organized by the NSS/NCC/ECO Club to raise awareness about plastic waste, food waste etc.

#### Liquid Waste Management

Adequate liquid waste management is ensured. Chemical Lab Waste is destroyed with utmost care and safety. Proper drainage system is functional in the institution. Various department and student level sensitization programmes are organised from time to time. Proper disposal of sewerage in the septic tanks is ensured.

#### Biomedical Waste Management

to showcase their talent through cultural representation. The students Biomedical waste is segregated and put in different coloured bins. The waste is also disposed of in the pits dug in the institution. Garbage collecting vans of Municipal Corporation regularly visit the college to collect the waste. Vending machines with incinerator are established in the institution for the proper disposal of menstrual waste.

#### E-waste Management:

A committee is constituted to auction the waste and whatever is left un-auctioned is destroyed through sanitary landfill or incineration method. LED lights are used in some parts of college campus for conservation of energy. Moreover, the Kangra district administration has also started a campaign to tackle the problem of unscientific disposal of electronic waste which causes health and environmental hazards. Under this, Dharamshala has become the first city in Himachal where electronic waste will be collected and disposed of scientifically by experts.

Response: To ensure inclusiveness in the society, education is a key element. Keeping in view this fact, the Govt. College, Dharamshala, being the oldest institute of higher education in the state, nurtures a vision to devise sundry ways to create an inclusive environment for students and staff. The students from different regions of the state, including tribal areas, take admission here at Govt. College, Dharamshala. Also, the students belonging to Tibetan Buddhist Community take admission in the college in good number as McLeod Ganj, the headquarters of 'Tibetan Govt.-in-Exile' in India' and also the abode of His Holiness Dalai Lama, is a prominent town in Dharamshala. Therefore, college has the students from different communities and regions with varied languages and cultures.

**Initiatives Taken by the Institution:**

**Linguistic Diversity:** The college has the amalgamation of different cultures, ethnicities and dialects as the students hail from far flung regions of the state ( Lahaul Spiti, Kinnaur ,Chamba, Upper Shimla etc.) as well as from the other states (Chhattisgarh, Punjab, Haryana, Bihar etc.) thus leading to linguistic diversity. To ensure respect and acceptance for each language the college provides various opportunities to the students which include the literary event sand cultural programmes. Practice No. 1

Title: Student Leadership Development Programme

Objective: To build up the leadership potential in youth by ensuring their participation in Leadership Development Camp and also by providing a platform Tourizmo Trigarth Carnival where plethora of opportunities are provided to develop creative thinking and problem solving skills, organizing skills, adaptability, among others. To hone the leadership skills of the youth, competitions in this carnival are organized and managed exclusively by the students. They are provided ample opportunities to interact and learn from the experiences of many eminent speakers. This practice is initiated with a vision to motivate the students to develop a confident voice to serve the nation regardless of the career they choose. The Context: Student leadership Development Programme is organized keeping in view the holistic development of the students. Ample opportunities are provided to the students to showcase their skills. The programme immensely helps in sharpening the Event Management skills, Organizing Skills, Social Networking, Adaptability and Hospitality among others skills. Keeping in mind the different facets of the personality of the individual, the students are provided a chance to participate in miscellaneous activities catering to their taste and talent. It helps them in overcoming certain inhibitions and instills confidence. To identify the students suitable for a particular event/ competition, screening is conducted prior to the event by the screening committee constituted of the senior students. These opportunities prepare the students to meet the challenges of the future.

The Practice: Student Leadership Development Programme is practised through the programmes like Tourizmo Trigarth Carnival, Leadership Development Camp, and other Social Service Units like NSS, NCC and Rovers and Rangers etc. In Tourizmo Trigarth Carnival, many competitions are organized and

managed by the students on their own. In this mega event which has the tag line “It Starts with Us” not less than twenty competitions are organized. A large number of students participated assiduously in a series of development activities which include Declamation, Debate ( Intra college and Online National level) Photography, Balanced and Technical Ride Traditional Dress and Fashion Competition Painting, Rangoli, Mehendi, Card Making, Poster Making, Caption Making, Slogan-Writing, Extempore Speech Competition, Singing (Folk, Solo and Group), Dance( Duet, Solo and Folk), Tourizmo Trigarth Award for the stakeholders of the society. Apart from these, webinar series in which eminent speakers led in depth discussions advocating the importance of leadership, Self-discipline, Career options and Stress Management etc. An online debate competition was organized at the national level. During Pandemics when everything came to a standstill, students continued participating virtually in the carnival. Many unique online competitions like Himachal Cuisine competition, Video Making competitions on Herbal plants and their benefits etc.were the special features. The Social Service Units like NSS, NCC, and Rovers and Rangers conduct activities aim at creating an organized, trained and motivated youth with leadership qualities in all walks of life.

Evidence of success: The success of the carnival can be evaluated by the massive participation of the students who got registered with the quick and the efficient registration process. The number of participants and events kept on increasing since its beginning, thus proving its success\*. The challenge of financial constraints was overcome by the sponsors who continued coming ahead for help so that the event could proceed successfully. This event also ignited the spark in the students to seek career opportunities in the field of Tourism.

**Problems Encountered and Resources Required:**

As Tourizmo Trigarth Carnival lasts for a long duration, to successfully organize the carnival was one of the biggest challenges that the institution faced. Since the institution has its own financial constraints, paucity of resources was another challenge. To arrange traditional costumes for the students participating in different cultural programmes was also an issue. As the institution has the students from remote and distant places, so to set coordination among different mental levels of students and also to utilize their full potential was the major concern. Setting of such a schedule which ensures a healthy entertainment, is a source of rich information and keeps the audience captivated for long duration without being monotonous was yet another challenging task. There were technical faults like power failure. Safety and security of the girls’ students during Student Leadership Development Camp was another issue that was taken into consideration.

**Practice No. 2**

**Title: Cultivating a Compassionate Heart**

**Objective:** In this ultra modern age of cut throat competitions to achieve success, cultivating a compassionate heart is the need of the hour. The institution has a firm faith in the vital role of human values in the development of society. Value Education to students in higher education is fundamental for transformative learning. Seeds of care, compassion and empathy can be sown during these college years. Getting students engaged in community services helps them to grow more sensitive to the need of compassion and also increases their awareness and understanding of social issues.



The Context: Cultivating a Compassionate Heart is initiated keeping in mind the impact of materialism, selfish attitude on the modern society. To preserve the age old traditional values is the feature of this practice as this will help in building a strong and progressive nation. The practice emphasizes on the need to preserve the rich traditional heritage of ancient Indian Education system that urged on the importance of moral values in personality development. With this motive, the students are encouraged and motivated for community service. The faculty members frequently engage them in various extension activities to make them strong, to shoulder social responsibilities and emerge as good human beings. Focusing on younger generation is essential because the complex challenges of the globalized future rests in their hands.

The Practice: Cultivating a Compassionate Heart is practiced through motivating the youth for selfless social service. The faculty members render relentless support and guidance to the students for this. They

try to cultivate compassion and empathy among students by accompanying them on visits to places like school for specially challenged students, old age homes, slum areas and even shelter for stray cattle and dogs. They are taught that even the small gestures like feeding the stray animals with edible kitchen waste, attending to the wounded or injured animals and birds, making judicious use of water, keeping water bowls and seeds for birds etc. can go a long way in transforming their own individual personality and can prove to be a strong foundation for a value based society. NSS Units of the college remain active in community service with the motto 'Not Me But You' and have been the pioneers in the commendable task of restoring and rejuvenating dried up water bodies in and around village Khaniyara. This initiative is highly acclaimed by the government authorities as well. During Pandemic social service units of the college rendered assistance to the administration as 'Corona Warriors'. They also made masks at their homes to be distributed in the slum areas. Another step in this direction has been addressing the need for emotional and physical support for traumatized students. The faculty of Psychology provides counseling services and hold interactive sessions for such students suffering mental health distress.

Evidence of success: The evidence of success can be seen in the change in the attitude of the students towards stakeholders in the society. Students of the Department of Psychology conducted case studies and held counseling sessions with the individuals facing mental health issues, substance abusers ( in Prayas Bhawan with the help of Red Cross Society) and the forsaken old people in the old age home, located at Dari. The sudden increase in the old age homes is stigma on the so called modern progressive society. To empathize and provide emotional support to such old people who have been neglected and deserted by their members of the family in the last stage of their life. The students also visit Locomotor Disability Children's Home at Dari in order to teach specially abled children.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required: Some students show unwillingness to assimilate the culture that stands different to their own and to eradicate such deeply rooted prejudices by counseling was a complex task to handle. Some show reluctance to visit the places outside the college campus like slums and old age homes. It was also difficult to manage time after the college hours as some of the students come from distant places. Setting the schedule with the timings of their bus is also one of the considerations.
